When Pius XII died Mr Claud Cockburn was a patient in hospital in Youghal, the Irish town where Sir Walter Raleigh planted the first European potatoes; so he decided to run "a book" on the ensuing papal election. After considering "form" he elected "John of Venice" eight to one on favourite and "cleaned-up". To his surprise, he writes in *I, Claud* (Penguin, 7s. 6d.), his friends "while congratulating me, in their civil Irish way, were

looking at me askance." After further thought he decided that "cardinals who are seeking to elect a pope are directly presided over by God [Who] inspires them ... and for a gambler, even a Catholic, to bet upon the result, is claiming to have advance knowledge of the mind of God..." And if the gambler is a Protestant? "In this case the situation becomes really offensive and one which no decent-minded person would care to contemplate."

In palliation, but not in justification, of Luther's conduct we must admit that the abuses of the Church were terribly many and bad; that he was never a real proficient in the correct theology of the schools; that his morbid fear of inevitable damnation led him to clutch at a justification by faith for a human nature incurably given over to the concupiscences by the fall of Adam; and that the growing difficulties of the position which he had made for himself ... drove

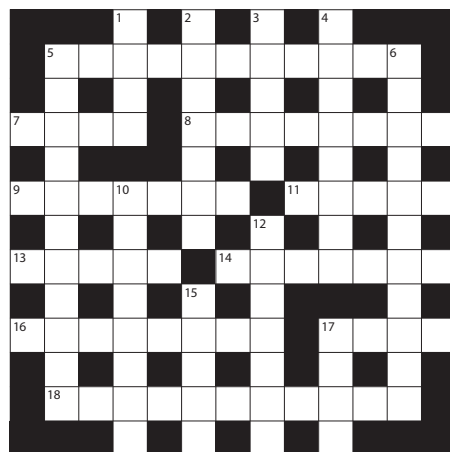
him into recklessness. He always held reason up to scorn, and that emboldened him to carry out many of the mad performances which are not to be attributed to pure malice defying the clear light. He was a clever man, but his intelligence was constantly mastered by his wild emotions. Coarsenesses in word and act came from him unrecognized in their turpitude. A physician reading of his bodily ailments would at once infer mental unbalance.
