50 years ago

THE TABLET • 16 SEPTEMBER 1967

The element Antimony was the discovery of a fifteenth-century German monk, the Prior at Erfurt, called Basil Valentine, which he first tried on the monastery's pigs, and it did not do them any harm. He then tried it upon his monastic brethren and it made them so ill that he christened it anti-moine, meaning hostile to monks. In a treatise which appeared many years afterwards ... called *Curris Triumphalis Antimonii*, he says, "Antimony is an excellent

medicine for alchemists, but a most powerful poison in the hands of the ignorant" ... It was not Valentine's argument that the ignorant would take too much, but that antimony itself was only good for a certain intellectual type, though this did not really square with his first experiments, unless he could say that while it had done no harm to the monastery pigs, it had also failed to do them any good, since they were not educated alchemists.

100 years ago

THE TABLET • 15 SEPTEMBER 1917

We regret to record the death of Dom John Placid Pritchard OSB, of Erdington Abbey, who was killed on 4 September. Shortly after the war broke out, he obtained his Abbot's permission to offer his services to the St John Ambulance Corps ... In August 1916, he was sent to Petrograd, to help the Russian Red Cross. In a letter to his parents he gave an interesting account of their Christmas midnight Mass: "... We had


midnight Mass said by a Polish priest on an altar of ammunition boxes scantily sheltered beneath a small tarpaulin ... It was bitterly cold and everybody and everything, save the tiny altar, was covered with a thick layer of snow, which fell continuously throughout the service, forming the only source of light except two small candles on the altar. I think everybody was praying chiefly for the same thing—that next Christmas may find us all at home and at peace."


