50 years ago

THE TABLET • 18 FEBRUARY 1967

Over a hundred clergymen of all denominations, Christian and Jewish, marched through the City of London on Friday last week to bear witness to their concern for peace in Vietnam. That a hundred and ten or so should have come is evidence of the increasing anxiety that the situation in Vietnam is causing. The organisers – an ad hoc group – included not only the Bishop of Woolwich and Fr. Simon Blake O.P., but also Westminster's new auxiliary, Bishop Butler O.S.B., and the Archdeacon of the other

Westminster, the Ven. Edward Carpenter. Catholic clergy, however, were very few and far between. We could count only four: two Dominicans, Frs. Simon Blake and Laurence Bright; Canon Francis Bartlett; and Mgr. Bruce Kent. And of these four two at least could decently have been excused on account of other commitments: Mgr. Kent had to desert the procession before it finally reached St. Paul's to say Mass for his students; and Fr. Bright had to hurry off afterwards to catch a train for a weekend conference.

The death of the Duke of Norfolk has drawn from his countrymen in general appreciations of rare fitness and even affectionate warmth. But where others lament the loss of a sterling Englishman, we far more the loss of a sterling Catholic. With a double service he served us who can relate his public duty to his private devotion. We had the privilege to know the whole man. In him indeed was a simplicity which permitted no such duality of parts. He was a Catholic first and last – when he swung a


thurbible in youth at the Oratory and when he issued edicts about the miniver and the strawberry leaves that go to the making of that Arabian Nights Entertainment of real life – a King's Coronation. Whether he was entertaining fifty thousand Sheffield school-children, or a shooting party at Arundel, the same impulse, and that a religious one, was at the back, perhaps even at the front, of his mind. When he built great churches ... or when he went to fight in South Africa – he was just equally at duty's post.


