This is a very disjointed talk," said Miss Dorothy Day when she had finished a rambling forty-five minutes' account of how she attended the recent Lay Congress in Rome at a meeting of Pax in London on Friday evening last week. [It] was well worth listening to: especially, perhaps, for her quiet refusal to get involved in the kind of bishop-baiting some of her audience would have desired ... She and her colleagues had founded the

Catholic Worker thirty-four years ago without any ecclesiastical permissions of any kind (though the monthly has the sympathy of some bishops). "We represent the tremendous freedom there is in the Church," she said, "if people would take it and act on their conscience." She summed up her paper's achievement by saying it had had the "nuisance value in the Church of stimulating people to think about things they'd sooner not think about."

100 years ago

The Cardinal Archbishop [Francis Bourne] preached on Sunday at St. Mary of the Angels, on the occasion of the celebration of the Feast of St. Charles. His Eminence dwelt upon the fact that the great Saints of the Church passed, during their lives, through great trials and difficulties. They met with failures and reverses, but perseveringly overcame them all ... Men and women had to sanctify themselves in the strange times through which

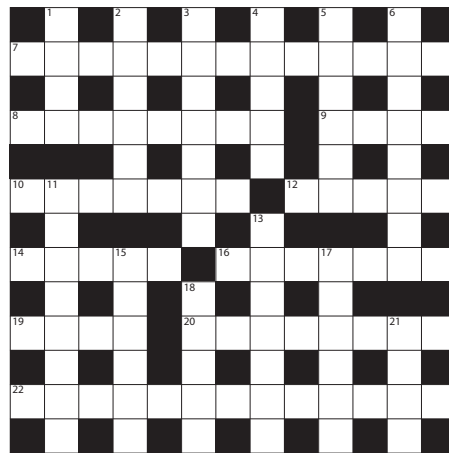
God had willed they were passing now. He had been privileged ... to spend the last fortnight in the midst of our soldiers on the Western Front, in close contact with them, and seeing their daily life ... Happily, in the case of many it had meant a closer drawing to our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ, a closer understanding, a deeper understanding, and a more definite practice of those religious truths which they accepted.


