Bishop Gordon Wheeler ... examined the provisions in higher education for the formation of both clergy and laity from which, he affirmed, must come a conflation within the Church of the whole people of God imbued with the spirit of Vatican II ... The formation of the priest today must be much more closely related to the culture of the country, and priests in training must be more closely united with those preparing for other professions

through the educational institutions of the national system. Bishop Wheeler ... went on to wonder if perhaps the Papal Athenaeum at Heythrop might not be too cut off from the mainstream ... it seemed possible that it might have to move into the precincts of Oxford University. Only by an increase in the rapprochement that was taking place with State institutions would we be able to make good the present dearth of any real expertise in theology.

100 years ago

THE TABLET • 18 MAY 1918

On 14 May, the Convocation of the University of Oxford assented unanimously ... that what was Parker's Hall henceforth and for ever be St Benet Hall, and similarly Plater's Hall become Campion Hall ... The name Campion Hall was welcomed by the Fellows of St John's College, of which Blessed Edmund himself was in his day a Fellow ... These two new names are full of meaning. They mean, in the first place, an understanding between the


University and the two Religious Orders concerned, that these two Halls are to endure permanently. Further, the name St. Benet's Hall restores St. Benedict to Oxford, and links up with the mediaeval Benedictine foundations, Durham College (now Trinity), and Gloucester Hall (now Worcester). Blessed Edmund Campion's name is cleared of treason against Elizabeth, and he is admitted for what he was, a martyr in the cause of religion solely.
