## 50 years ago

THE TABLET • 5 OCTOBER 1968

Much has been written about the individual conscience both as regards contraception and the acceptance of the encyclical [*Humanae Vitae*] ... As Christians we know that we must always act with what present light we may have, but we know also that there is for us ... a course of action entirely in harmony with God's will for us as individuals ("Thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven"). This we may fail to see here and now through ignorance, carelessness,

education, emotion, present or past moral failing. But Christians, and above all Catholics, know that they have in grave matters of belief and morals a wholly reliable yardstick, agreement with the teaching of the Church ("I believe whatsoever else the Church proposes to be believed"). To follow that is never to renounce true reason, though it may sometimes imply transcending the conclusion to which our own reasoning has apparently brought us.

## 100 years ago

THE TABLET • 5 OCTOBER 1918

Wednesday's papers contained the announcement that by Monday evening [General Allenby's] cavalry had made their way and established themselves on the north, west, and south of the city of Damascus. During the day's advance 1,000 prisoners and five guns were taken. To this a French paper added the detail that we were within two miles of the place, the fall of which was expected at any moment, and that French cavalry were advancing on

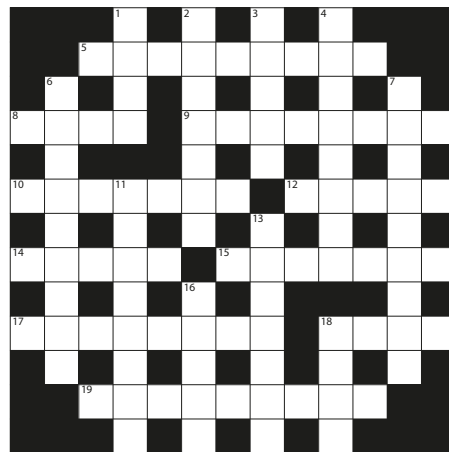
Beyrut. The fall of the historic city of Damascus soon followed, for on Monday evening it was entered by troops of the Australian Mounted Division; and at six o'clock next morning the city was occupied by a British force and some Arab troops. Over 7,000 prisoners were captured. But only a few ... guards were left, the rest of our troops being withdrawn, and the responsibility for its administration left temporarily in the hands of the local authorities.
