One of the great arguments for clerical celibacy is that it leads to a very high standard of golf among the Catholic clergy. I saw something of this for myself last week on the Ayrshire coast, at the close of the Universe Annual Golf Competition, when Plymouth diocese beat Shrewsbury at a play-off, and it was astonishing how high the average skill is, on a broad steady average of four strokes to a hole, or 72 holes for under rather than over three

hundred strokes. I am told that the Anglican diocesan clergy cannot match this level, partly because they would not like the parson's wife to be spoken of as a golf widow. Golf is full of useful similies for the pulpit, a microcosm of human life in that every performance falls short of perfection ... Particularly gratifying ... was that there were prizes for the runners-up—people to be encouraged at a time when the Church is so full of runners-down.

100 years ago

A number of hitherto unpublished letters written to Cardinal Manning by Florence Nightingale show how near to the Catholic Church she was at one time; and how helpful Manning was in shaping and helping her vocation as a nurse. We quote one letter written in June, 1852: "You do know now, with all its faults, what a home the Catholic Church is. And yet what is she to you compared with what she would be to me? No one can tell,

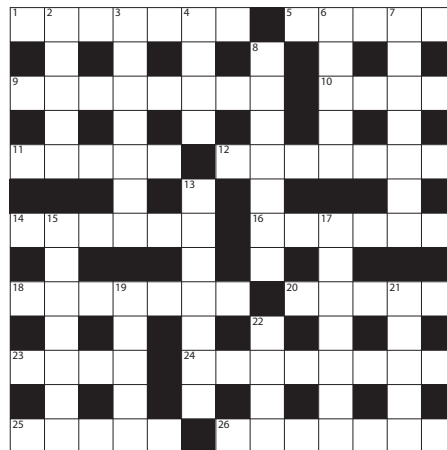
no man can tell, what she is to women, their training, their discipline, their hopes, their home; to women because they are left wholly uneducated by the Church of England, almost wholly uncared for, while men are not. For what training is there compared to that of the Catholic nun?" Then she makes it clear what she means: "... [I speak] from experience. There is nothing like the training which the Sacred Heart or the Order of St Vincent gives to women."
