Of what did he die? asked the visitor; and the instant reply was: "What every great Irishman dies of – a broken heart." John Redmond's death, the result of heart failure following on a major operation, has been chronicled ... The


approval of his own conscience was the single applause he sought. By no fault or failure of his own, he fell short of the consummation of his dearest wishes as a patriot who knew too that "patriotism is not enough". His figure remains in memory as that of a lonely man; at the last, by many a deserted man. He had his hour of almost dereliction, and he will hold in history his fixed place apart – John Redmond, John of the Cross.
