# 50 years ago

Tineteen hundred and sixtyeight will go down in the history books as one of the most eventful in the life of the Church. It is tempting to see last August as the watershed, with strong currents divided from then onwards by Humanae Vitae. Would these carry the faithful in different directions and out of call? Humanly speaking, it looked like it. But it is nonsense to talk in human terms of the Church. There has ever been a humanly catastrophic element in her way of living - and a

divine salvific principle. Divided counsel, tension and crisis do not necessarily spell disruption. They may well be the prelude to a deeper self-knowledge and a more realistic spirit than went before. If timidity should stifle these possibilities of growth, then indeed we are in a bad way. If the prophets of doom would really look hard at the life of the Church in this past twelve months, they would find resilience and resourcefulness and widespread concern for her well-being.

## 100 years ago

r Lloyd George may be congratulated on having won a victory at the polls which is without parallel in the history of the country. It has been called a khaki election - and in a sense that is quite true. To their eternal honour, the people have iudged the competing candidates not by their promises on the hustings, but by their record in the war. The result is, in the first place, a vote of confidence in the Prime Minister, a vote of

confidence in the man who, by an impatient gesture, took the reins of power from the fumbling fingers of Mr Asquith, and translated a policy of drift and "wait and see" into one of action and audacity. But we shall best understand the motives which made so many men and women crowd to the polls to support the Coalition if we note the fate which overtook each and every member of the Pacifist group in the late Parliament. Not one escaped.




