There is no inconsistency in holding the Latin Mass, as we now know it, to be the most treasured heritage of seven centuries of Christian civilisation, deeply rooted in primitive Christianity, and in recognising at the same time that its use in the vernacular serves an invaluable pastoral purpose today. There is no necessary conflict ... Indeed our own view is that they should reach a reasonable *modus vivendi* ... A totally new

situation, however, has been presented by the publication of a new translation of the Canon by the International Committee on English in the Liturgy (ICEL) ... It passes comprehension that the bishops of this country should have accepted, even provisionally, this so-called translation ... Nobody who studies it line by line with the original can fail to notice that it is a prime example of that "desacralisation" against which the Pope has warned the Church.

100 years ago

A good many weeks ago an announcement appeared in some papers of Father Cameron's name as the new Bishop-Coadjutor [to the Bishop of Argyll and the Isles]. That was exceedingly premature; as a matter of fact, it was in print before Father Cameron himself, who was in Macedonia, had heard anything of the matter. He has since been in Rome ... and on Tuesday was received in audience by the Holy Father. It does happen

sometimes that a prelate or priest chosen by the Holy See has reasons for hesitation in accepting the high charge of the episcopacy ... Father Cameron, with the Pope's heartiest blessing on the work he was doing and should do, left to report to the War Office with a view to continuing his present work as chaplain. But prelates and priests who ask that the charge be not laid on them then, sometimes find that release means but postponement.


