the heart of every Christian life.

He was born in Bekaa Kafra, a village high in the mountains of north Lebanon, in 1828, the fifth child of a mule driver and his wife. He lost his father at an early age, entered a Maronite monastery at the age of 23, and in 1875, with the permission of his abbot, withdrew to a hermitage, spending the rest of his life in contemplative isolation. During this time, it is said, he did not see a single human being, but only looked at the Blessed Sacrament.

After his death in 1898 there

were various wonders associated with his tomb, and miracles soon followed. These miracles greatly contributed to the popularity of his cult, which spread throughout the Lebanese diaspora. St Charbel's picture or statue is often found in Mexican churches, a focus of intense devotion.

The Maronite Church is an ancient branch of Antiochene Christianity that has never been out of communion with Rome. Pope Paul VI, who beatified and canonised Charbel, hoped this Lebanese Maronite saint would be

a way in for us Westerners to the riches of the East: "May he make us understand, in a world largely fascinated by wealth and comfort, the paramount value of poverty, penance and asceticism, to liberate the soul in its ascent to God."

Charbel also reminds us of the origins of Christianity in the Aramaic world, a world now fast disappearing. And he reminds us that the Catholic Church breathes with two lungs, one Western and one Eastern, to the advantage of both.

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


