## A good and peaceable man

THE FUNERAL Mass for Seamus Mallon, one of the architects of the Good Friday Agreement, was celebrated on Monday in Saint James of Jerusalem Church, Mullaghbrack, Co. Armagh. This was the church where the former Deputy First Minister was baptised, near the school where he had been the headmaster before being drawn into politics via the civil rights movement.

Anne McHardy, former Ireland correspondent of The Guardian, remembers visiting Mallon at his home in the mainly loyalist village of Markethill in the 1970s, where he had been born and raised and which he never considered leaving. There were constant threats of violence, and the security services had installed bullet-proof security glass over his living room windows. "See what I have done," he said, showing me round his garden, where the glass had been re-used as seed frames. "I can't do what I have to do if I live in fear," he said. "And that glass made me afraid."
Mallon's autobiography A Shared Home Place ends with the words: "As I prepare to take my leave of our shared home place, I find

comfort in an old Greek proverb: 'A society grows great when old men plant trees in whose shade they know they will never sit'"

IT'S ONE OF the great puzzles of modern politics. Why did austere, prim and godly evangelicals put a boorish playboy into the White House? In Trump and the Puritans historian Martyn Whittock and our own James Roberts deftly unpick the slender thread that runs from the Pilgrim Fathers to Trump's unexpected election victory in 2016.
Among those queuing to have his copy
signed at the launch at Church House Bookshop was Ian Paisley Jnr MP, who enjoyed a private dinner with Trump last year and is hopeful that the President will one day visit his North Antrim constituency. In his speech James thanked his "disputatious yet congenial" colleagues for their help and support; James' views about the Trump administration are more opaque in his book than they are in the office. He dedicates Trump and the Puritans to "Claire, Antonia and Ann-Marie: Greatest gifts, greatest blessings, my daughters." Trump and the Puritans is published by Biteback at £20; Tablet bookshop price, £15.

THE ELECTION of Cardinal Giovanni Battista Re as Dean of the College of Cardinals reminds us that it was Re, then its prefect, who asked Cormac Murphy-O'Connor to join the Congregation for Bishops in 2009. "He suggested that I might bring more harmony and balance to the discussion of appointments in English-speaking countries", is how Cormac tactfully puts it in his memoir An English Spring. In fact, Re had come to feel corralled into a series of appointments of US bishops eager to pick a fight with Catholic Democrats they regarded as not Catholic enough, and wanted Cormac's help in moving the US bishops' conference to less belligerent ground.
