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# Real presents

"PRINCE PHILIP: A Celebration", an exhibition just opened at Windsor Castle, displays some of the presents he and the then Princess Elizabeth received when they married in 1947. There's not a toaster or a kettle in sight. The government of Greece – once ruled by Philip's grandfather – went for a Grecian urn with an image of Eros. Pope Pius XII opted for something more decorous – a pair of his and hers gilded chocolate cups with handles, lids, saucers and floral decoration.

Perhaps the Meissen porcelain prompted a warming of relations: Princess Elizabeth visited Pius XII in Rome four years after her wedding; as Queen, she went on to meet John XXIII and John Paul II. In 2010, when she and Prince Philip met Benedict XVI at Holyroodhouse at the start of his state visit, they presented him with a facsimile of a drawing by Hans Holbein the Younger of Catholic martyrs who had been executed on the orders of previous English monarchs. When they met Pope Francis in 2014, the Queen tried a more diplomatic tack, offering a basket of goodies from the royal estates including eggs, honey and whisky. Francis gave the couple a present for their newly born great-grandson,



Prince George. No, not a rattle or a babygrow, but a lapis lazuli orb topped with a cross. The Queen told Francis that George would be thrilled – "when he's a little older".

CLASHING THREADS have always added lustre to the Dominican tapestry. In the current issue of *The Lamp*, a handsome Catholic quarterly published in Three Rivers, Michigan (www.the lampmagazine.com), Fr Aidan Nichols OP shares his personal recollections of Herbert McCabe OP, who was buried in Wolvercote cemetery 20 years ago this week. They met in the autumn of 1970, when 22year-old Nichols was beginning his novitiate at Blackfriars, Oxford, and Fr McCabe had just been reinstated as the editor of *New Blackfriars* after a hiatus of three years prompted by his declaration that the Church was "plainly corrupt" (though that was no reason to leave it). In 2019 Fr Nichols caused ructions of his own when he signed an open letter to the bishops of the world calling on them "to take the steps necessary to deal with the grave situation of a heretical pope".

Nichols writes with candid distaste for McCabe's unreconstructed Marxism and deepgreen Irish republicanism. Their theology, too, ran on different tracks. As Nichols ruefully observes: "Herbert's distinctive approach to Saint Thomas, and his admiration for Wittgenstein, equipped him to speak to modern philosophers in the Anglo-American tradition in a way that I could never do." But in McCabe's sermons, "The dogmas of Holy Mother Church were magically reconfigured as the most exciting of original ideas." And Nichols admires the elegant doctrinal purity of McCabe's A New Catechism of Christian Doctrine, an old-fashioned question-andanswer summary of the Christian faith published in 1985 by the printers of the "penny catechism", the Catholic Truth Society.
