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The real secret of a successful marriage

IT WAS BILLED as a "private" event for family and invited friends, but Vatican cameras and photographers recorded it, and the guests many of them Latin American diplomats were ushered to their seats by papal "gentlemen". Maybe it was because Pope Francis was celebrating the Mass in St Peter's Basilica along with the "C6" cardinals, and Cardinal Marc Ouellet, prefect of the Congregation for Bishops, was giving the homily, that "private" didn't quite capture it.

The occasion was the fiftieth wedding anniversary last Thursday of Uruguayan historian Professor Guzmán Carriquiry Lecour and his wife Lidice. They renewed their marriage vows before Pope Francis underneath Bernini's throne of St Peter.

Until he stood down in April, aged 75, Carriquiry was the longest-serving layperson in a Vatican executive role by a mile. He began his service in the Holy See in 1971 under Paul VI, rose to be undersecretary of the Pontifical Council for Laity under John Paul II and was appointed secretary of the Pontifical Commission for Latin America, or CAL, by




Benedict XVI in 2011. Carriquiry has been an adviser and friend to the man who is now Pope Francis ever since he was the provincial head of the Argentine Jesuits, and few doubt that in retirement he will continue to write the odd speech for him.

After a poignant Mass the party moved to the Casina Pio IV, the marble Renaissance villa in the Vatican gardens, to tuck into champagne and cake. We learnt that Guzmán's and Lidice's thirtieth anniversary and renewal of vows had been celebrated by none other than Archbishop Jorge Mario Bergoglio, five years

after Cardinal Eduardo Pironio had done the same. "You have to keep on and on renewing your vows," Carriquiry told papal biographer and Tablet contributor Austen Ivereigh. "It's the only way you'll last." Ivereigh's wife Linda was just out of earshot.

WILL HE BE the City's first saint? John Henry Newman was the son of a London banker, and was born in the Square Mile. There's no trace of the family home left, of course, or of the school he was sent to in Ealing. But his father's handsome country house in Ham still stands and Joanna Bogle's Newman's London: A pilgrim handbook (Gracewing), very nicely illustrated by Malgorzata Brykczynska, describes a lovely walk to it through riverside gardens from Richmond station. As a small boy, Newman lay in bed in this "house of dreams", watching candles being put in the windows to mark Nelson's victory at Trafalgar.

Newman's father went bust when he was still at school and the summer house had to go. Newman paid a visit a few years later with his father and one of his brothers, and a gardener gave them three apricots. His father gave him first pick. "I took the largest," Newman wrote in a letter 40 years later to his friend Henry Wilberforce, "a thing which still distresses me whenever I think of it."
