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The heartbeat of Trócaire

"BRILLIANT, boisterous, passionate, wise, mischievous, irreverent, fearless and enormous fun." Clare Dixon of Cafod, who knew her for 40 years, was one of the many friends and colleagues to pay tribute to aid worker Sally O'Neill, whose death in a car accident last Sunday night sparked an outpouring of grief and love.

Originally from Dungannon in Co. Tyrone, Sally joined the Irish Church's overseas aid agency, Trócaire, in 1978. She worked primarily on projects in Latin America but was also involved in providing famine relief in Ethiopia in the mid 1980s. Following her retirement in April 2015 after 37 years of service, Sally worked as a volunteer with prisoners and migrants in Honduras, where she lived.

"Sally was the heartbeat of Trócaire for almost 40 years," the agency's director, Caoimhe de Barra, said. "Although we still cannot believe she is gone, we know that she left an incredible footprint on the world."

A FORMER ambassador to Mongolia, Catherine Arnold, has been announced as



the next master of St Edmund's College, Cambridge.

St Edmund's, which was founded in 1896 to house a small community of Catholic students, is the only Cambridge college to boast a Catholic priest as its dean. Catherine will join the college as master elect in September 2019, and take up the office of master on 1 October. She will live in college with her Mongolian cat, Merlin.


The priest she recommended was Conrad Pepler OP, son of the printer Hilary Pepler, for many years a close friend of Eric Gill. Fr Louis Roy OP, professor of theology at Dominican University College in Ottawa, who lived briefly with Fr Pepler in Blackfriars, Cambridge, has written to tell me that Fr Pepler had once explained that he and Wittgenstein had met twice, each time in Oxford.

When the philosopher lay unconscious on his deathbed, at the invitation of his friends Fr Pepler said the office of the dying and gave conditional absolution. "He was a very holy and prayerful friar, with profound insights into the Christian life," Fr Roy tells me. "Wittgenstein could not have found a better spiritual accompaniment as he prepared for his encounter with the God of love.

Fr Roy's own exchanges with Anscombe during his stay in Cambridge were not wholly satisfactory. "Her esteem of me was perhaps rather low," Fr Louis explains, "since she had heard me, in a Sunday homily at Blackfriars, wanting to say 'successively' about the Samaritan woman, wrongly say that "she successfully had five husbands."
