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# Francis and Claire

LAST SUMMER, Claire Henderson Davis, who has been navigating previously uncharted territory between dance, choreography, liturgy and theology for several years, was approached by Tim Higgins of the Society of St Francis, who had been to a workshop she had given at Chester Cathedral. "He asked if I would be interested in creating a performance that brought the charism of St Francis into engagement with the contemporary world," Claire tells us.

When I heard that Bishop John Arnold was turning his residence, Wardley Hall, into a Laudato Si' education centre, the idea for All *Creation Waits* was born. It's a dance/ theatre piece that imagines a contemporary St Francis and St Clare coming to terms with the need to leave their existing lives and join the movement for change. It is the story of a growing friendship between Clare, a symbol of the earth herself, wounded and desecrated, and Francis, who is disturbed by Clare's arrival before being ultimately transformed through their relationship."

The premiere is at Salford Cathedral in their Assembly Room next Saturday, 25 January at 7pm; admission is free but booking is essential via Eventbrite.




CHRISTOPHER DAVID, a regular name on our letters pages, died on 26 December at the age of 93. Christopher was ordained from the Beda in 1955 and served in parishes in Wales before deciding to leave the priesthood. He trained as a teacher and started and ran pastoral centres at Wick Court, Bristol and Crosby Hall near Liverpool. From his family home near Monmouth, he and his wife Gill organised convoys of lorries taking supplies to refugee camps in Croatia during the Bosnian war.

They moved to Lanzarote in the 1990s, where they set up Niños del Tercer Mundo, which raised money to build schools and community centres in the developing world. Christopher and Gill supported the Chambo seminary in Ecuador; they were asked by the bishop to take charge for a time, which they did for several months. After Gill's death, Christopher returned to Lanzarote, where he held a weekly meditation group. His eldest daughter, Angela Charles, tells us: "Christopher was a deeply spiritual man, who would always support and take the time to listen to those in need."

"Nothing very remarkable," his cousin Guy Neely says modestly, "but his life shows how much former priests can contribute, and what others might do in the post-sacerdotal era into which we are moving."
