WORD FROM THE CLOISTERS

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Palpably marvellous

IN THE latest volume of his memoirs, *Varying Degrees of Success*, which covers the years 1992-2020, David Lodge recalls a visit to Chicago in 1995 to speak at a literary festival. The night before, he had dinner with Fr Andrew Greeley, the extraordinarily prolific sociologist and novelist, at a restaurant in the John Hancock Centre, a celebrated modernist skyscraper and city landmark. To Lodge's surprise, it turned out Fr Greeley lived in a spacious and meticulously furnished apartment in same building.

The next day Lodge spoke in the cavernous St James Episcopal Cathedral. "I belong to the last British generation for whom marriage was the only socially approved way of having sex," he told his audience. "There was a special twist to the Catholic teaching... in that when you finally succeeded in getting married you had to choose between having less sex than you wanted or more babies than you wanted." Lodge gambled that there were enough Catholics in Chicago who had read *How Far Can You Go?* for this line to get a laugh.

DAVID LODGE reveals in *Varying Degrees* of Success (published next week by Harvill



Secker) that he "got the idea" for *Thinks...*, his 2001 novel mixing campus politics and Catholic guilt-tinged adultery with ruminations on the mind-body conundrum, from a long review by John Cornwell in *The Tablet* of some recent books about human consciousness. Lodge spoke generously of us when he gave the star turn in 2015 at the literary festival in Birmingham that marked our 175th birthday. Nearly six years later, we're having another bash at a festival – though this time we aren't able to offer the lure of a day out in Birmingham

to help sell tickets. All the events are online.

The novelist Francis Spufford is among our guest speakers. When he was interviewed by Peter Stanford for *The Tablet* earlier this year, he reflected that it was a mistake to try to sidestep, ignore or somehow justify things that go wrong in the Churches. "Christianity is not a clubbable, lowered-voice, bestbehaviour, Sunday-best kind of thing ... it is not a denial of the chaos and destructiveness of human experience, but an accepting reconciliation of them, arms wide open."

How does such talk go down in the literary circles in which he has moved since starting his career working at a publishing house? Spufford pointed to the transformative role of the Pulitzer Prize-winning American novelist Marilynne Robinson. "She is so palpably marvellous, and her marvellousness is so palpably connected to her faith, that she has prised open a space in literature for people to be curious," Spufford said.

And guess what? On Saturday 28 May, as well as Spufford and Stanford, Marilynne Robinson will be talking to Erik Varden about the themes of fall and redemption in her novels.
