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Legendary fisher of young souls

OLD FISHES – as alumnae of New Hall School near Chelmsford are known – learnt last month of the death of the legendary Sr Mary Francis CRSS, headmistress from 1963 to 1986. Frances Wood arrived at New Hall aged five. "They had to make a special table and chair for me," she later said. By the time she was 12, she was certain that she wanted to become a nun. She was appointed headmistress at the age of 32.

Sharp, droll, full of vision and ambition, she would hurl herself enthusiastically into new projects. Numbers grew, day students arrived, a riding school was opened. Sr Mary Francis would sometimes blindside parents by declaring that boarding schools were "a necessary evil", and that if she was a mother with a "decent-sized family" she would not send her children away to school. "In a perfect world, parents would have their children at home, and have enough of them so that they would learn to live with one another."

"A royal search for illumination", depicted Henry of Blois of Winchester has been challenged by John Comiskey, a Canadian professor of church history. Henry of Blois was a bishop, but the figure, as Comiskey points out, is shown wearing a pallium, which is reserved for archbishops. "Could it be Becket himself?" wonders Comiskey. Or did Henry insist on being depicted as an archbishop?

The caption was provided by Winchester Cathedral, which includes the illumination in its "Kings and Scribes" exhibition. Christopher Norton, whose theories on the Winchester Bible featured in our article, points out it shows Jerome presenting his Latin "Vulgate" translation of the New Testament to Pope Damasus. So it is not Henry of Blois, says Norton, but "Pope Damasus robed as an archbishop". He explains: "Prior to the introduction of the papal tiara, popes were regularly represented in art in archiepiscopal robes with a normal mitre."


FRANCIS CAMPBELL tells us that when her regulars on *Thought for the Day* gathered on Zoom to say farewell to the producer Christine Morgan on her retirement, there was one notable exception: Pope Emeritus Benedict XVI.

Pope Benedict filled the slot on Christmas Eve 2010. Campbell explained: "It followed behind the scenes lobbying by a director general of the BBC, several cardinals and the odd government minister. After three years, Christine's coalition delivered."

Campbell, who was then British ambassador to the Holy See, helped steer the project – the first time any pope had ever written and recorded a script for a particular broadcaster – through the labyrinthine paths of Vatican diplomacy. "So what now for Christine?" Campbell wonders. "Based on her 2010 success a career in diplomacy would be a good next step."
