## Getting Hitched...

"SPIKY enough to draw blood and sweet enough to give you a sugar rush", is how Dan Hitchens describes his new venture, The Pineapple, a newsletter now available on the Substack online platform: https://dan hitchens.substack.com/

Hitchens - son of Peter, nephew of Christopher - has the family knack for fluency and conviction. But even when he is commending the "magnificently unoriginal" Humanae Vitae and lamenting the dark night of confusion and muddle that has descended on the Church he's never less than brilliant company.

Still implausibly young - "I share the year of my birth with Dead Poets Society, Francis Fukuyama's The End of History?, and the Stone Roses' debut album, which has aged somewhat better than the rest of us" Hitchens joined the Catholic Herald as deputy editor in 2016, and took over as editor from Luke Coppen in late March last year. After overseeing the transition from a weekly to a monthly he has left after seven issues.

The Herald's new editor is based in Rome: author and seasoned Vatican hand Christopher R. Altieri, who spent more than a dozen years on the news desk at Vatican Radio, has a doc-

torate from the Greg and has appeared in several Catholic newspapers and magazines.

YOU HAVEN'T heard of Substack? Neither had I till a couple of months ago. Founded in 2017, it's an online platform that allows you to write and send e-mail newsletters without anyone checking your political respectability or your spelling: if you can pull in enough paying subscribers, you can make a living out of it (though only a few do). It's an increasingly popular online pulpit for freelance journalists like Hitchens, along with philosophers, poets,
mountaineers, cooks, therapists and baseball fans. In return for providing a soapbox for you to perform on, Substack takes a small cut of your income. There are thousands of newsletters on Substack and more than 250,000 paying subscribers
As well as the sweet but prickly fruit Hitchens named his newsletter after The Pine Apple, a tavern in Covent Garden where his great hero Samuel Johnson used to dine out for eightpence in his early years as ajournalist. Pineapple is also the name of the modern dance studio nearby which boasted "Here careers are made, dreams are broken, bitching is an Olympic sport and everyone is fabulous!"

At some point we'll probably have to cough up to enjoy a slice of The Pineapple. But for now it's free.

THE PENN CLUB will close its doors for the last time at the end of March, just as it was about to celebrate its centenary, another casualty of the lockdown. It offered austere but affordable and friendly accommodation around the corner from the British Museum, and has been a favourite of Tablet readers visiting London for many years. Even during lockdowns, the Club remained active, providing free accommodation to key front-line workers at the nearby University College Hospital.
