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The gift of reading

THE NEW Rector of the English College in Rome, Fr Stephen Wang, has just published Sycamore: The Catholic Faith Explained (The Catholic Truth Society). It stands alone or can be read by the groups who use Fr Wang's popular films and other catechetical resources. The Sycamore programme developed from Fr Wang's previous job as a university chaplain, and combines sturdy doctrinal purity with the savvy register you'd expect from a regular broadcaster who has been living with students in Newman House in Gower Street for the past eight years.

"When we had the manuscript ready I decided to add a few pictures to break up the text," Fr Wang says. "I thought this would be an afternoon's work, but it took a month of blood, sweat and tears. There are now over a hundred colour illustrations. How do you mix classical religious art with contemporary culture? How do you represent the incredible diversity of global Catholicism with a small selection of photographs? It's impossible. And let's face it," he adds ruefully, "when someone gives us a book, even



if we never actually read it, we all look at the pictures.

Two readers Fr Wang is hoping will at least pause to read a few paragraphs are Pope Francis and Pope Emeritus Benedict. At the General Audience last week, Francis spoke to each of the new seminarians at the English College in turn, and then greeted their new Rector, who smartly passed the Holy Father a copy of his new book. The following morning, the Pope Emeritus was presented with a copy by Cardinal Vincent Nichols - when the Cardinal had visited the English College earlier

in the week, after Fr Wang had given him a copy of the book he had asked him, "Have you got another copy?" Cardinal Nichols was shortly to make his first visit to the Pope Emeritus for many years, and was happy to give him a copy of Sycamore.

"You can't plan this kind of thing!" said a beaming Fr Wang.


