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Staying with Friends

THE PENN Club, which has been housing NHS key workers for free during the lockdown, is open again to tourists. Now in its centenary year, it is much loved by Tablet readers, who appreciate the competitive prices for a hotel handily placed just around the corner from the British Museum.

Founded a hundred years ago by veterans of the Friends Ambulance Unit, which had provided medical aid to British and French troops during the First World War, it maintains a Quaker ambience: stillness, simplicity, crisp white linen, and no lift.

The writer John Wyndham moved into the Club in 1925, paying £10 a month for a room, and didn't check out till nearly 40 years later. He started writing science fiction after picking up a copy of the American pulp magazine Wonder Stories in the reading room, though he only became successful in the 1950s with the publication of *The Day of the Triffids*.

When in 1963 the secretive Wyndham, then 60, announced that he had married a friend called Grace Wilson, his friends were flabbergasted. He had met Wilson, a teacher and



a fellow resident of the club, when they were both 27. Though men and women normally occupied separate floors, Wyndham and Wilson had lived in adjacent rooms for over 30 years.

THE FRENCH-Canadian Jesuit priest Gaston Roberge, author, critic, teacher and pioneering figure in Indian film studies, died in Kolkata on 26 August at the age of 85.

His love affair with Indian cinema began when he chanced upon Satyajit Ray's "Apu Trilogy" in 1961 during a stopover in New

York while on his way to Kolkata. So mesmerised was he by the first of the films - Pather Panchali - that he watched the entire trilogy in one sitting. He went on to create the Chitrabani communications centre in Kolkata with Ray's support and collaboration. It became the main centre in India for the serious study of film and other media.

A friend of Mother Teresa, in 2005 Fr Gaston invited the sociologist Gëzim Alpion to give a series of lectures about his fellow Albanian. "Fr Gaston accompanied me throughout the nine days I stayed in Kolkota to all the homes for the dying run by the Missionaries of Charity," Dr Alpion told us. "There was no place, poor or rich, where he was not recognised and greeted by people who knew him. They were of all ages and religions. We were invited to house parties and meals at restaurants by so many of his friends."

When Dr Alpion suggested to his host that Mother Teresa's decision to become a nun might have been affected by the death of her father, he was surprised by Fr Gaston's response. "He told me he wondered if he too had decided on a vocation to the religious life when as a child, after his father's death, he had said his mother: 'I will be a priest and always stay with you."
