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Easter mercy

THE WRITER and lecturer Kathleen Murphy, a Sister of Mercy living in London's East End, remembers the Maundy Thursday when she set out to a local nursing home to visit an elderly parishioner. As she walked through the streets of Whitechapel she tried to think about what it might have been like to have been one of the disciples with Jesus in the Garden of Gethsemane.

Arriving at the home, she noticed an unfamiliar face. George had only recently arrived for respite, following an operation for cancer, which he had been told was likely to be terminal. His wife, he told Sr Kathleen, was Catholic but not a Mass-goer. He was not baptised. "I would love to be able to drive myself and my wife to church on Sundays," he explained. Having unburdened himself, George looked refreshed. On Easter Sunday, Sr Kathleen went to see George again. He was determined to become a Catholic. "Anyone listening to him might have thought he had won the lottery," she says. A priest visited George to give him instruction, and in view of his prognosis decided to receive him into the Church after a couple of weeks. At his baptism, the Gospel reading was the story of



Jesus in Gethsemane. George had been offered and accepted suffering like Jesus, and through it he had found faith.

Kathleen tells the story in her latest book, The Splendour of Caring, published by St Pauls. Six years later, George is still driving to Mass.

EVERY PRIEST brings a unique history and experience to his ministry. Rosemary Chambers of Alresford, Hampshire, writes to tell us about the late Fr Louis Beasley-Suffolk, a dearly beloved father, grandfather, brother, uncle, friend - and the parish priest at St Luke and Teresa's Church, Wincanton, for many years.

"The Church has lost an exceptional priest," she tells us. In his funeral address, Declan Lang, the Bishop of Clifden, spoke of Fr Louis' kindness and wonderful sense of humour. Others spoke of his close-knit family, who looked after him in his final illness. Celibate priests are often canny observers of the fairground ride of family life, but Fr Louis, who decided to seek ordination to the priesthood after his wife Mary's death, brought an insider's perspective to his ministry. "He was a family man, with all the experience and understanding of the joys and occasional trials of being the father of seven," Mrs Chambers recalled.

Fr Louis once openly criticised the Church's prohibition of artificial contraception in a sermon. He told his congregation that the teaching that it was a grave sin for a married couple to use the Pill had done untold damage to the Church, and that many Catholics felt they could no longer support an institution which still had its head in the sand on the subject of birth control. Perhaps startled at the mention of Humanae Vitae in a sermon, Mrs Chambers reports that when Fr Louis finished speaking, "the entire congregation clapped".
