## The deeper current

THE OBITUARISTS have been, perhaps unexpectedly, kind to John Bruton, the Irish politician from a wealthy farming background who was not afraid to rattle the country's household gods. As a youthful finance minister he had unwisely proposed adding VAT to the price of a pair of children's shoes; in his retirement he declared the Easter Rising of 1916 neither helpful nor just; his favourite sport, he confessed to incredulous colleagues, was tennis. The eulogies acknowledged his decency and good humour, and his part in unleashing the Celtic Tiger and laying the foundations for the peace process. What few noticed was the ground beneath Bruton's feet: a cleareyed but unshowy Catholic faith. It coloured everything he was and did.

While Bruton often seemed to be swimming against the tide - challenging the failure of imagination that blotted out a million unionists from the national story and, later, casting a sceptical eye on secularisation - he touched on a deeper, older current in Irish life, a kindness, a peaceableness, a curiosity about the lives of others, and a willingness to make a difficult situation a little better without making a huge fuss about it. He was, perhaps more

than anyone, responsible for the ban on divorce being removed from the constitution, yet was pro-life in a way that brought together a lifelong resistance to violence as a means to achieving political change with advocating a "No" vote in the 2018 abortion referendum.
In his homily at Bruton's funeral in Dunboyne, Co. Meath, last Saturday, Bruce Bradley SJ quoted Seamus Heaney's remark that the biggest shift he had seen in his lifetime had been the evaporation of the transcendent from our inner life, and our "exile into a universe with no up or down, no internalised system of moral longitude or latitude, no sense
of a metaphysical roof over our heads". Bruton was always keenly aware of the unexpected chills that can strike a society when its metaphysical roof has blown off.

BRADLEY WAS headmaster of Clongowes when Bruton's son Matthew was at the school. Himself a past pupil, Bruton accepted his invitation to attend Union Day at Clongowes (a combination of family day, past pupil gathering and prize-giving) a few months after he had unexpectedly become Taoiseach in December 1994. He was 47 , the youngest man ever to attain the office, and was surprising everyone by his smooth handling of the difficult dynamics of the improbable Rainbow Coalition of his own centre-right Fine Gael, the Labour Party and the Democratic Left.
Bradley tells us that Bruton was presented with a framed photograph of his great hero and fellow Old Clongownian, John Redmond, whose gradualist constitutional politics had been swept aside in the nationalist fervour that dominated the 1918 election. In his address Bruton pointed out that Redmond's political career had been extinguished for reasons beyond his control and the ability of anyone to foresee. "The end of our life," he advised his young audience to remember, "is not in this world but in the next."
