Ken's kindness

OUR PARIS correspondent, Tom Heneghan, a New Yorker who has reported from all over the world, tells us that the Welsh novelist Ken Follett has donated the earnings from his latest book, *Notre-Dame: A Short History of the Meaning of Cathedrals*, to the restoration of the Gothic Cathedral of Saint-Samson in Dol-de-Bretagne, a small town in Brittany.

It's handily placed for Follett to keep an eye on progress. "I really like the west of France," Follett says. "It's close enough to England that I can drive there in a day." Follett wrote a string of successful spy thrillers before scoring his biggest success with *Pillars of the Earth*, about medieval cathedral builders.

Saint Samson was a bishop from south Wales who built a monastery in Dol-de-Bretagne in the sixth century. The austere granite cathedral was built in the thirteenth century after King John of England – or *Jean sans Terre* as he is known in France – burned down a previous Romanesque cathedral on the same site. He repented by coughing up for the current building.

Two days after the Notre-Dame fire, Follett's



French publisher asked him to write a short book on what France's most famous cathedral meant to its admirers. "She said she would donate the publisher's profits to the rebuilding fund and, if I wished, I could do the same with my royalties. Yes, I said; of course, I'd love to," he wrote later. Seeing that Notre-Dame had attracted so many donations, it was suggested he support the refurbishment of Saint Samson de Dol-de-Bretagne instead. Follett agreed.

"It's a twist worthy of his best novels," the Catholic weekly *La Vie* wrote.


