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# Law and delight

THE OBLIGATION to attend Mass on Sundays is set out with characteristic crispness in The Catechism of the Catholic Church: "The Sunday Eucharist is the foundation and confirmation of all Christian practice. For this reason the faithful are obliged to participate in the Eucharist on days of obligation, unless excused for a serious reason (for example, illness, the care of infants) or dispensed by their own pastor. Those who deliberately fail in this obligation commit a grave sin' (CCC 2181).

Although the public celebration of Mass resumes in England today, 4 July, considerable hesitations, constraints and cautions apply, and Catholics are still dispensed from the obligation to attend Mass. But at some point, the obligation will be reinstated. It will be tricky to get the timing right; and striking the right tone, too, will need a sure touch.

We asked Fr Ladislas Orsy if he had any words of advice for our bishops. No-one in the Catholic world is a better juggler of the letter of the law with the language of joy and



thanksgiving. Orsy once neatly described canon law as: "A system of structures and norms to secure freedom for the people so that they can receive, without impediment, the gifts of the Spirit."

Orsy joined the Georgetown Law faculty at the age of 73 after (supposedly) retiring. That was 26 years ago. He was born in Hungary on 30 July 1921; he entered the Society of Jesus in 1943 and was ordained in 1951. He studied law at Oxford and at the Gregorian in Rome, where he was teaching during the Second Vatican Council. He worked on the preparation of the new Code of Canon Law, adopted in 1983.

"I have tried more than once to write about the 'obligation to attend Sunday Mass' - but it is difficult to be both compact and comprehensive," he told us. "When it is time for the bishops to give directions, I suggest their message should be framed not in legal terms but in the context of thanksgiving - the great and perpetual thanksgiving prayer of the Church that is the Eucharist – a blessing that should flow out into our daily life.


"It isn't helpful to speak of the 'obligation' to attend Mass on Sunday 'under the penalty of sin", Orsy gently insists. "Better to stress the sweet (suavis) expectation of our Redeemer. Then the personal responsibility of the faithful can be explained: each person should be generous and prudent, in particular parents taking care of their children or with responsibilities for the elderly or the sick."

For Orsy, one might think of the "obligation" to attend Mass as the "obligation" we might feel to attend the birthday celebration of a beloved friend: an obligation that is serious, but which we fulfil out of love and delight, not out of fear of incurring a forfeit or penalty.

"A rescue operation is overdue," Orsy told us. And perhaps the months after lockdown might be a good moment to launch it.
