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The day Jack's Irish squad met the Pope

THIRTY YEARS ago, Mgr Liam Boyle flew to Sardinia to see Ireland's opening game against England in the 1990 World Cup. "I was just there as an ordinary punter," he told us this week. When he was asked to say Mass for the Irish squad at their hotel, he had to borrow vestments from the local church.

"Most of the team were Catholics. Jack stood a little to one side. He was very respectful. He was a very decent, generous, kind man. He joked that if Ireland got beaten, he would bring in a Church of England vicar for the next game."

In fact Ireland got through their group, and then defeated Romania in Genoa in a penalty shoot-out to reach the quarter finals, where they would play the hosts in Rome. Boyle recalls: "At dinner after the game against Romania, I was sitting in between Jack and the physio, Mick Byrne." Jack had promised Byrne that if Ireland got to Rome, he would meet the Pope. He asked Boyle he if he could pull a few strings. "I knew Sean Brady, who was rector of the Irish College at the time, and he and Bishop Tony Farquhar made the




arrangements. There was no bother. We were the only team that had asked for an audience."

Famously, Pope John Paul II, a decent goalkeeper as a young man in Wadowice, talked tactics with the Irish keeper Packie Bonner. The next day, Bonner spilled a speculative shot from Roberto Donadoni, leaving the goal wide open for Salvatore Schillaci to poke the ball home, and Italy won 1-0. Ireland's fabulous World Cup adventure was over. In the dressing room afterwards, Jack lit a cigarette. "Packie," he said in his laconic Ashington drawl, "the Pope would have saved that." Monsignor Boyle, who celebrated his ninetieth birthday two weeks ago, still says Mass every Sunday in the parish of Knockaderry, in the diocese of Limerick.

THE AUSTRALIAN historian Nick Brodie didn't miss a single Sunday Eucharist during the pandemic – having been behind the camera on the other side of the altar each week.

"Our first Mass was the digital equivalent of an underfunded field hospital," Nick tells us. "Fr Brian stood at the altar. I was at the altar too, standing close on the other side. With me was an old bookshelf, upon which was mounted a repurposed monitor arm with my old Nexus 7 tablet attached to it by every elastic band I possessed. Mum texted me afterwards to say it reminded her of the home Masses we had when I was a kid."

"We gained liturgical complexity over subsequent weeks," Nick, who belongs to the parish of Sandy Bay-Taroona in Tasmania, says. "Proximity to the microphone made me conscious of the need to say the people's parts for and with the whole Christian community, and heightened my sense of their being mysteriously present. And while feeling privileged and a bit unworthy to receive Communion in such times, I was acutely aware that it is always done for the sake of the world outside."
