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One step enough

IN MAY 1985, the Vicar of the University Church of St Mary the Virgin Oxford, Peter Cornwell, mounted the pulpit to announce that he had decided to seek admission to the Roman Catholic Church. He was following the path his predecessor John Henry Newman had taken 140 years before, and The Times mooted a "third spring" for Catholicism in England, with a wave of further conversions. It was an acknowledgement of Cornwell's influential standing in the Church of England. Less than three years later, he was ordained a Catholic priest. He died on St David's Day after a brief illness. He was 86, and had been an Anglican priest for nearly 25 years, and a Catholic priest for nearly 33.

His conversion, like Newman's, came from a deep pondering of church history and a yearning for communion with the universal Church with and under the Pope. The Second Vatican Council's vision of renewal and ecumenism had excited him, and continued to do so for the rest of his life. After the election of Pope Francis, he said that after years of loyal opposition, it now felt like being in government.


A socialist and one-time pacifist (whose National Service was spent as a hospital



orderly), he greeted kindred spirits with a hearty "Good Morning, comrade!" as he walked to the Co-op for his *Guardian*. In *One Step Enough*, the memoir he wrote shortly after his reception into the Catholic Church, he describes meeting Hilary Lord in the summer he was teaching at Cuddesdon under Robert Runcie. They were married the following February. "I am by nature a lonely person," he writes, "reticent about opening up in confidence even to my closest friends, so that, thrown in upon myself I can become introspective and brooding. I have no doubt that I have needed Hilary to make me more complete." Archbishop Maurice Couve de Murville once told him: "Look after her, you won't get another." They had two children, James and Elizabeth.

His Catholic ministry embraced prison chaplaincy at Oxford (a vital period) and school chaplaincy at Prior Park College in Bath in the 1990s, which proved transformative for the school, followed by service in the Bath deanery parishes. Those (few) who accused him of being too "liberal" or "an Anglican at heart" must have missed his great sermons on the Marian solemnities and Corpus Christi or the queues when he was hearing Confessions.

One Step Enough is a hope-filled apologia and it's impossible not to wonder if we were not a bit of a disappointment to him. Giles Mercer, headmaster of Prior Park between 1996 and 2009, told us that Peter never even hinted that that was the case. "He embraced the Catholic Church, warts and all, in spite of annoyances and frustrations. He was a joyfilled person, with wonderful humour and breadth of vision. He always knew reform would be a long haul, and never completed. All who came into contact with Peter Cornwell were treated equally and with huge kindness. They were brought closer to God."
