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# An interesting life

PREACHING at his sister Maev's funeral Mass on 29 July, the biblical scholar and theologian Gerald O'Collins recalled flying down to visit her when she was studying in New York and he was spending a sabbatical in Boston. The fiercely independent-minded and indefatigable Maev would rope her younger brother in to lend support to her various causes. One weekend, she was minding five Australian aborigines visiting the United Nations; another, the FBI raided her church and arrested Philip Berrigan for his protests against the war in Vietnam. "I have never known a Christian who practised more faithfully what St James wrote in his letter: 'Faith without works is dead," her brother said.

Maev was born in 1929, and grew up near the Melbourne seaside town of Frankston with her two older sisters and three younger brothers, of whom Gerald is, as he told us, "the last man standing". Her mother said to Maev: "If you don't plan to marry, have an interesting life." She spent 16 years as a social worker in Melbourne, counselling families, and later taught for 20 years in Papua New Guinea, where she became



Professor of the Department Anthropology and Sociology, before retiring to Canberra.

A colleague described her as "a champion for vulnerable people, a person of extraordinary warmth, welcome, and conscience"; in the words of one of her nephews, "Maev embraced life with open arms. She transformed the mundane into the magical and the everyday into a great adventure.'

WHEN, five years ago, Timothy Radcliffe OP, Master of the Dominicans from 19922001, had two operations for cancer of the mouth and was threatened with death, he resolved to muster his thoughts about what it means to be fully alive. The result was Alive in God: A Christian Imagination. It is his most ambitious book so far, and it embodies the message at the heart of Timothy's life and work: as Christians we can make the hearts of non-believers burn within them if we can communicate the truth that our religion is "not just a moral code designed to keep us in order, but a vibrant way of life"


Timothy learnt a few weeks ago that he has cancer again. "This time", he said, "it is in the jaw." A few days before he underwent surgery on Monday, he told us: "It's a rather grisly operation. They remove a few inches of jaw bone and replace it with bone and tissue from my leg. I have often put my foot in it, but not until now my leg!"

Readers won't need to be asked to keep Timothy in their prayers.


