WORD FROM THE CLOISTERS

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The hillbilly rector

"EVERYONE WHO'S read Wise Blood thinks I'm a hillbilly nihilist," the virtuoso of the Southern Gothic novel, Flannery O'Connor, once wrote, "whereas ... I'm a hillbilly Thomist." The phrase gave eight Dominican friars studying and playing music together at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, DC the perfect name for their band, which played informally for small groups in DC and New York City.

The music of the Hillbilly Thomists ranges widely - one track on their latest album is a cover of the African-American spiritual "Jacob's Ladder" - but you could file most of it under the loose term "Americana", with a strong influence of bluegrass - a frantic, highpitched descendant of English, Scottish and Irish folk music. They released their first album in 2017. Their third, Holy Ghost Power, came out this summer. They've just completed a six-city tour, the friars, along with their banjos, guitars, washboards, spoons and cowbells, all fitting into a large hired van. On 1 August they performed at the Grand Ole Opry in Nashville, Tennessee, where they were joined on the famous stage by Dominican Sisters of Saint Cecilia in



Nashville, who clapped, sang and laughed along with the friars.


One of the Hillbillies, Thomas Joseph White OP, studied theology at Oxford. Fr White is the founding director of the Thomistic Institute in Washington, DC, which promotes all things Aquinas on every platform where it can secure a foothold, and last year he was appointed the new Rector Magnificus of the Angelicum in Rome. We have a vision of Fr White and his band returning to Oxford and packing out the Sheldonian. "The friars in the band have thought about playing in Europe," Fr White told us. "Of course it would

be a more expensive venture and timeconsuming. Naturally we all have jobs as priests that are difficult to get away from for any extended period. I'm hoping to find a way to have some or most of us play in Rome at the Angelicum eventually."

FR WHITE WILL be among the guests at our Autumn Festival of online events which will run on Wednesday and Thursday evenings through October. We'll ask him the allimportant question of whether he will be able to continue playing the banjo and teaching Thomistic metaphysics. During the festival, Tablet luminaries such as Ruth Gledhill, Christopher Lamb, Joanna Moorhead and Maggie Fergusson will be talking to leading writers, thinkers, poets and musicians. As well as Fr White, they will include Abbot Christopher Jamison and the American publisher and writer Robert Ellsberg, whose latest book, Dearest Sister Wendy, is drawn from several hundred letters he exchanged on an almost daily basis with Sr Wendy Beckett during the last three years of her life. More details of speakers, dates and how to buy tickets will be in the next issue of *The Tablet*: forgive me for reminding you again that this will appear in two weeks' time, on 3 September. Even Tablet editors need the occasional break.
